Creating a Culture of Literacy in. School **V** CHECKLIST Children in all grade levels participate in sustained silent reading every day. Quality children's books are used in display cases featuring a book theme or author. Books are commonly used as special gifts such as on the birthday of each child in the school or as a "welcome to school" gift. Author studies and book reports by children are on display in the hallway and in classrooms. When possible, children's book authors come to the school to visit and talk to the children. Children take books home from the school library each week. Children from older grades have buddies in younger grades that they read to on a regular basis. Specialists build children's books into their music, art and physical activity programs. Teachers work with parents to encourage them to read aloud to their children at home. Teachers show children how to treat a book with respect by handling it gently and with clean hands. Children are empowered to be authors and illustrators of their own books. Books are celebrated at school-wide festivals with activities to extend the books. The school principal reads aloud to children in their classroom or at lunch. Families are invited to visit the school library and check out books with their child. Reading and writing challenges occur during the year. A used book exchange shelf is set up for families to take books home to keep. Books and reading are the main topic of some school assemblies and special guests are invited to read aloud. Teachers use books as part of every area of discipline. The school library is sufficiently funded so that new books can regularly be purchased. Teachers attend trainings to inform, inspire and keep them up to date on children's literature.
