Babies Belong at the Library: a Collaboration Between All Tompkins County Public Libraries and Family Reading Partnership by Shawnee Emmett

B abies belong at the library. That's the motto behind a collective initiative launched in April that provides every baby in the county with their own special, colorful library card.

"Babies Belong at the Library" is an invitation to families to "come, stay, and play" at any of Tompkins County's six public libraries.

"The heart of a culture of literacy in any community is the public library," says Brigid Hubberman, Family Reading Partnership's executive director. "Public libraries are such a wonderful place to surround families with books and to connect families with each other," she says, adding,

"We intentionally used the word 'belong' in the title. We need to feel we belong when we have a baby... It's a basic human need to know that you belong."

It also encourages families to make their local library one of the first places they visit with their new baby.

"If this habit begins early, we believe that families will continue to enjoy the resources and support offered by libraries throughout their child's life," Hubberman says.

The initiative is a collaboration between Family Reading Partnership and all six Tompkins County public libraries, each of which has or plans to have regular baby and toddler story times followed by playtime. "Our libraries today are not the quiet libraries of the past; they're really a community center," says Sarah Glogowski, head of youth services at Tompkins

County Public Library. "We're here for everyone and that includes babies."

Playtime at the library combines books, singing, reading, movement, and socializing, says Glogowski, all crucial components for building a foundation for lifelong learning.

The idea to give every baby in Tompkins County a library card grew out of Family Reading Partnership's

community-wide call to action, *Every Baby! Every Day!* Talk. Sing Read. Play. launched last year. The goal of the campaign is to ensure all children born in Tompkins County are surrounded by words, songs, and stories right from the start.

at Birth program and has a copy of the book, "The Very Hungry Caterpillar," by Eric Carle, as a special gift to the new baby and family. The library cards will also be available for families to pick up at their local library or through many community organizations that work with families. The card can be easily activated at any of the six public libraries in Tompkins County.

"Reading to your baby every day not only promotes early language development but carves out a special time for bonding between baby and their family or caregiver," says Elizabeth Stilwell, early childhood specialist with Family Reading Partnership.

"Babies recognize early on that books are a place and time for quiet shared joy, love, and connection," says Stilwell. "Babies are learning all the time from

every interaction and reading is an activity that engages them with language and one-to-one interaction," she says adding: "When you read a book and say, 'Oh see the puppy?' and the baby looks at you and points

at the puppy and makes the connection to a real puppy, that's the kind of engagement that just lights up the baby's brain and that's what we want to see happening in the first year."

To help parents and caregivers choose the right book for their two-month-old or nine-month-old, for example, Family Reading Partnership developed a list of "50 Books for Baby's First Year," which is included with the library card. The list of board books has stories with rhymes, word plays, colorful pictures, song, and movement. The collection is available at all six public libraries.

Additionally, in special recognition of welcoming babies and supporting their families, all six public libraries have adopted a policy that there will be no

late fines on board books.

Each library, too, encourages families to stay and read with their baby by providing cozy reading areas, some replete with rocking chairs and changing tables.

"It's so important that families know that babies are welcome at the library," says Annette Birdsall, director of the Ulysses Philomathic Library in Trumansburg. "We know they'll cry, that they have diaper needs. We want to make sure that this is the place for them to begin their journey toward a love of books."

Words of Love: a Community-Wide Initiative by Melissa Perry

his February, the entire community—and beyond—was invited to take part in Family Reading Partnership's newest initiative, *Words of Love*! In the form of a lovely, interactive bookmark, *Words of Love* encourages families, and gives them the tools to surround their children with loving words each and every day of the year.

Words are transformative in how a child learns, grows, and gains self-esteem, influencing longterm success. Whether these words are spoken, read, or written as a love note, they relay the message to children that they are important, they are cared for, and they are loved.

Staying true to Family Reading Partnership's guiding principles, Words of Love aims to reach families at home and support them in giving quality, loving words to their children as a natural part of their everyday lives, right from the start. Conversation and vocabulary are crucial to a child's development. The words children hear heavily influence how they view themselves, the world, and their place in it. It's essential for children to hear an abundance of words in order to develop language, giving them the ability to communicate their thoughts, ideas, and feelings.

Children growing up in poverty hear 30 million fewer words by age four than their more affluent counterparts. This leaves an achievement gap that only widens as children age, hindering them from reaching their fullest potential. Furthermore, recent research demonstrates that the

quality of the communication between children and their parents and caregivers is as important as the number of words a child hears.² By simply giving children an abundance of rich, loving words through song, read-aloud, and conversation, we can begin to close

Looking back on 20 years of *Books at Birth*, it is incredible to think that it all started with a dream to create a culture of literacy in our community, one book and one family



My husband and I visited our daughter who has been working at Cornell University in Ithaca, for 12 months. We had a fantastic time in Ithaca. We even rented a car and drove around in New York State. Of course we visited Niagara Falls and New York City, but what really got me going was what I saw on some walls in Ithaca.

It was the great Read to Me! banners that told of the need to read and reread for toddlers. I could not help but take pictures of all the banners I saw. And since I'm a teacher, I could not help but to show the photos to my colleagues when I came back to school. They thought they were wonderful and we put them in our library. Many students asked what they meant, if they couldn't read English.

When our daughter came home from the US we got a card that said she had donated money to Family Reading Partnership in honor of us. We could not have received a better gift.

Volunteer Spotlight: Susan Koon

Susan Koon is the very definition of a long-time volunteer, having given her time to Family Reading Partnership for 20 years! We recently sat down with Susan to learn why she encourages others to join her in volunteering.

Q: Susan, Family Reading Partnership I now read to has been lucky to have you as a volunteer for many years. How did you Traveling Book first become involved?

Twenty years ago when I retired from teaching kindergarten and moved to Ithaca, I answered a piece in the *Ithaca Journal* that Joan Ormondroyd wrote about volunteering for *Traveling Books* through RSVP and she assigned me to Jody Boronkay's Evergreen Nursery School. And I lived happily ever after!

Q: Tell us a little about yourself.

I am 76 years old, born and raised in rural upstate New York (town of Canadice, Ontario County); went to Cornell and Syracuse; taught school in many places for many years. My two children are both living in Virginia (suburban DC) and I have two teenage granddaughters. Follow me on Twitter @SusanLuther2.

Q: Do you have a favorite children's book?

If I were to be marooned on a desert island with a group of children and there was only one book, I'd hope it was Jules Feiffer's "Bark, George." That said, I never met a children's book I didn't like.

Q: Do you have any special reading traditions in your family?

Read, read, read.

Q: Which Family Reading Partnership programs and events have you been involved with? Can you describe what you do as a volunteer?

I now read to four groups with *Traveling Books*: Corner of the Sky, East Ithaca Pre-School, South Hill Tots, and Aspen Grove. Every two weeks I carry in a crate of 20 picture

books, read to the children from a few, and leave the crate with them.

I also manage two *Bright Red Bookshelves*, at the county Human Services Building lobby and in the offices of Attorneys for Children. I stock the shelves with books supplied by Family Reading Partnership, gently used and ready for re-use, and keep the shelves tidy. This means going twice a week to the very busy Human Services site, and every two weeks to the Attorneys. The staff is always glad to see me and the books make a cheerful display.

Sometimes there is a one-time call for volunteers at the FRP headquarters, processing books or other materials for a special project. This is always clean, neat work and the company is good.

My other contribution is my North Cayuga Street front porch, handy as a drop-off site between Danby and other far-flung volunteers.

Q: What does volunteering with Family Reading Partnership mean to you?

The volunteering I do is perfect for



me, since 4-year-olds and I have the same attention span–14 minutes. They greet me like a rock star, "Here she comes! She's here!" and when I'm ready to leave they are reaching for books as if for jewels!

Q: If you were to give words of encouragement to inspire new volunteers, what would you share with them?

I would urge anyone who believes as I do that there is no higher calling than reading to children, or providing books for them and their families to read, to volunteer at Family Reading Partnership in whatever capacity you can. These are good people, doing good work.

Thank you, Susan, for all the ways you have been involved with Family Reading Partnership through the years! You have helped bring the joys of reading to so many children and families, and we are grateful!

Sharing Family Inspiration: Lorena Garmezy and Kevin Murphy

or Lorena Garmezy and Kevin Murphy, supporting Family Reading Partnership is a way to express a belief that every child and every family deserve the opportunity to explore the many worlds that books can open. "I will be eternally grateful to my mother, Alice Garmezy, for sharing her love of reading with me at an early age and for taking the time to talk, sing, read, and play every day," shares Lorena. "The library was always a place where I felt welcomed and checking out a new batch of books every week was exciting."

Lorena and Kevin believe in making books and reading aloud a natural part of every baby's life and that it expands the potential for everyone. "Children are hard wired to explore and imagine—we just have to nourish and feed what already exists!" says Lorena. "The message that you can read together ANY time or place is powerful. Communities that truly embrace early literacy cannot help but be great places for growing up."

"We first learned about Family Reading Partnership through my mother," Lorena explains. "She shared her interest and enthusiasm when she and my dad first moved to Kendal. It was a very natural progression to first give gifts in her honor and then get excited about supporting the organization on our own."

"Family Reading Partnership has done an incredible job giving families in Ithaca and the surrounding rural areas a wide range of resources," Lorena continues. "My dream would be to see even more communities get



excited about promoting and supporting early literacy. I believe deeply that Family Reading Partnership's wider mission and future is to serve as a mentor and model for what communities can do by working together for common goals. Just imagine the possibilities of living in a community, state, nation, or world that values and supports the potential of *Every Baby! Every Day!*"

Both Lorena and Kevin have tangible, lasting memories of reading with their families at a very young age, traditions that influenced their careers: Lorena as an elementary school librarian and Kevin as exhibit designer at the Strong National Museum of Play.

When asked what she loved most about those early trips to the library, Lorena says, "It is incredibly difficult to choose a favorite memory but the books by Robert McCloskey left a deep impression. Life imitated art when we later had the chance to pick blueberries off our own backyard bushes with a little tin pail—kuplink, kuplank, kuplunk!"

Kevin remembers his dad coming home from work each night with something new to read. "It was very exciting!" Kevin recalls. "In my career as exhibit designer at the Strong National Museum of Play, I had the tremendous opportunity to create many exhibits that focused on children's literature. In designing each exhibit, I dug deep into childhood memories to recall the magic of the books I was first exposed

to decades ago. It reawakened the memories of virtually every illustration, every thrill of turning the pages on the laps of my young parents half a century earlier."

The library was also a magical place for Kevin. "When I was growing up in the late 1950s and 1960s, the Geneva Free Library had a children's library in their basement; entrance was through a special, tiny bright red door. To me, it was entering into a magical place, which partially influenced the designer bug in me in later life to create special places for children on a much grander scale."

Lorena and Kevin continue to be inspired by their early family experiences to share the joy of books with all children through Family Reading Partnership. It's a way to honor the lasting gifts their families have given them because, as Kevin says, "You are part of everything you see, and hear, and experience, and you carry all these 'parts' with you throughout your life. Childhood literature is the most valuable thing you can provide to your child other than love, and I see them as the same."




Welcome to Pre-K Book
