
#### 4. Start Family Reading and Book Traditions

A tradition is an activity that a family has enjoyed together in the past and is likely to continue in the future because they value it. When sharing books becomes a special part of your family's traditions, books and reading will become an important part of your child's future.

I show my child that books are special by including books as gifts for birthdays, holidays, and special occasions—for adults as well as children.
 I welcome new babies with a book. I write a "Welcome Baby" message in the book to make the book extra special.
 We make our own books with pictures that my child draws or cuts from magazines and words that we add together.
 We have special *At Home with Books* nights when screens are turned off and everyone reads and tells stories together!

When children love to do something, they do it over and over again. Loving books is a habit that is never too early to start and one that will bring a lifetime of joy.

		I read my child's favorite books over and over if asked.
		I use books to explore the world and learn new things with my child.
		I let my child choose books that interest her/him.
		I pack books to take along in the car, on the bus or to appointments in case there is a wait.
		I find good times to read throughout the day in addition to bedtime. (At breakfast? Before supper? After a nap?)
		I say "yes" whenever possible, when my child brings me a book and asks me to read aloud.
